Appropriation Ordinance No 638

An ordinance making an appropriation in the sum of \$ 22,589.63 to pay the expenses of the city was introduced and put upon its first reading. Read the first time and under the rules was put upon its 2nd and final reading. Read the second time, considered by sections, and put upon its final passage. The question being. Shall the ordinance pass? A vote was taken which resulted in Ayes three, Nays none. the vote being unanimous for, the ordinance was declared duly passed.

Resolution & Agreement: State Highway Commission
And
City of Ottawa, Kansas

In Re: Federal Improvement of Main street.

Whereas, the State Highway Commission will obtain the approval of the Secretary of Agriculture of a project for the improvement of 0.506 miles of U.S. 50 known as Main street and designated as Kansas State Project No. NRM 273 B, to be improved with funds obtained under Section 204 of the National Recovery Act.

Now, Therefore, be it resolved by the Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas that in the event the above named project is approved and constructed by the State Highway Commission as called for in the plans and specifications, that the City of Ottawa will each year, at its own cost and expense, and subject to the provisions as set out in Section 4, Chapter 241, 1933 Session Laws, maintain the project in a manner satisfactory to the Secretary of Agriculture and the State Highway Commission.

The foregoing Resolution was duly passed by the City Governing Body and said Resolution, together with the agreement authorized thereby being now on file in the office of the City Clerk.

Resolution: In Re, Federal Improvement of Main between Logan & Wilson streets.

WHEREAS, The State Highway Commission of Kansas and the United States Bureau of Public Roads are desirous of constructing U. S. Highway No. 50, known as Project No. NRM 273 B, State of Kansas: AND WHEREAS, said Highway Commission of Kansas, and the United States Bureau of Public Roads of the Department of Agriculture of the United States, have made a requirement that if said highway is so constructed by them within the City of Ottawa, said city shall agree to refrain from permitting encroachments upon the right of way of the streets of said city over which said traffic is routed, to-wit, North Main street from Logan to Wilson streets: shall agree to refrain from passing ordinances, or laws, fixing the speed limit of said city at less than thirty miles per hour over that portion of North Main Street from Logan to Wilson streets covered by the above described project; shall agree to refrain from erecting signs, semaphores and signals of any character that will give preference to local routes, or to the traffic of cross or abutting streets that will delay or hinder traffic on North Main street from Logan to Wilson streets; said city having heretofore obtained and provided all right of way in said city as shown on an approved plan to be necessary for the purpose of so constructing said highway project within said city.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas, that in consideration of the State Highway Commission of Kansas, and the United State Bureau of Public Roads constructing said U.S. Highway No. 50 within the City of Ottawa, Kansas, said city hereby agrees with the State Highway Commission of Kansas and the United States Bureau of Public Roads, that it will not, in the future, permit encroachments upon the right of way of the streets of said city over which said traffic is routed, to-wit, North Main street from Logan to Wilson streets nor pass ordinances, or laws, fixing the speed limit of said city lwas than thirty miles per hour over that portion of North Main street from Logan to Wilson streets covered by the above described project, nor permit the erection of any signs, semaphores and signals of any character that will give preference to local routes, or to the traffic of cross, or abutting streets that will delay, or hinder traffic on North Main street from Logan to Wilson streets, over which the traffic of said highway project is routed, said city having heretofore obtained and provided all right of way in said city as shown on an approved plan to be necessary for the purpose of so constructing said highway project within said city, and said city further agrees that it will not pass any laws, rules, regulations or ordinances which would be in conflict with the above agreement.

Main street and the Governing Body, by a unanimous vote, authorized the issuance of a license for such business for the term of 6 months ending June 30th 1934 in accordance with ordinance No. 1566.


N.Main st Waterline Imp. Approved as a CWA Project.







In Re: Reduction of Gas Rates in City of Ottawa.

Due to the fact that no action has been taken by the Public Service Commission in the matter of the application of the City of Ottawa for a reduction in gas rates in this city at the Public Hearings held in Ottawa, September 21st, 1932 and November 22nd, 1932, the Governing Body has, from time to time, had numerous informal conversations with officials of the Union Public Service Company with the idea in view of securing some measure of the relief sought, together with the doing away with the Three-Part-Rate Plan of payment.

(over)

As a result of these informal conversations the Union Public Service Company did, on May 21st, 1934, offer to put the following optional rate into effect if satisfactory to the Governing Body.

\$.98 per M. cu.ft. for the first	2,000 cu. ft.
.78 per M. cu.ft. for the next	3,000 cu. ft.
.58 per M. cu.ft. for the next	25,000 cu. ft.
.48 per M. cu.ft. for the next	30,000 cu. ft.
.43 per M. cu.ft. for the next	40,000 cu. ft.
.31 per M. cu.ft. for all over	100,000 cu. ft.
1:25 Minimum bill per month.	

In conjunction with, and in addition to the optional rate concession, the Gas Company agrees to pass on to the Domestic consumer all the saving that would accrue in event the City would agree to divert to the Union Public Service Company all the local gas now being delivered under contract at the Municipal Water & Light Plant, if such gas can be purchased at a price substantially less than is now being paid the Pipeline Company.

The Customer Analysis submitted in connection with the optional rate offer sets out that an average of 11.7% (\$4251.37) savings would accrue to 41.2% of the Domestic Consumers. The analysis submitted in connection with the estimated annual savings from local gas sets out that an average of 19% (\$24,852.00) would accrue to all domestic consumers. This estimate is based on the present average town border rate of \$.37 per M.C.F. now being paid the pipeline company and assuming local gas can be purchased at \$.14 per M.C.F. at the City gate.

The Governing Body, after giving the foregoing offer careful consideration, came to the conclusion that it was satisfactory with the exception of the schedule of optional rates. This schedule, of course, is a step in the right direction but does not give a sufficient reduction in rates to justify its acceptance. Accordingly a schedule that would be satisfactory was worked out by the Governing Body and submitted to the Union Public Service Company for its approval. The proposed rate is as follows:

\$1.00 Minimum bill per month	
1.00 per M. cu.ft. for first	1,000 cu. ft.
.50 per M. cu.ft. for next	19,000 cu. ft.
.40 per M. cu.ft. for next	80,000 cu. ft.
.31 per M. cu.ft. for all over	100,000 cu. ft.

This proposed rate is based on the present gate rate of \$.40 per M.C.F. that is now being paid by the city and should the Public Service Commission be successful in obtaining a reduction in the gate rate the city expects to receive the benefit of such reduction. It is also understood that the savings in the local gas shall be passed on as set out in the offer of the Union Public Service Company. All communications and analyses in connection with this matter being on file in the office of the City Clerk.

The following letter was recieved by the City of Ottawa from the Union Public Service Company, the same being self-explanatory, to-wit:

On September 19th, 1934 there was left at my office by the City Attorney, a proposed agreement between the City of Ottawa and the Union Public Service Company, relative to rates for gas in the City of Ottawa. This was in a large degree a re-writing of the proposed agreement which had been submitted by the company to the City some time ago, but in which the schedule of rates to be charged was entirely changed.

I submitted this to the officers of the Union Public Service Company but on account of the absence from home of its president the answer was delayed. I have now received an answer from them to the effect that they have carefully tabulated the matter of rates proposed by the city and that if these rates were established they would result in a loss from operation, before interest and depreciation, of something over \$ 24,000.00 and for this reason the company is unwilling to enter into an agreement fixing the rates proposed by the city and has asked me to inform you concerning this.

I very much hope that there is some other basis upon which we can make a proper adjustment of this whole matter and would be very glad to confer with representatives of the City at any time concerning it.



Resolution: In Re: Activated Sludge Inc. and the City of Ottawa, Kansas as to the Agreement covering license for past infringements of patents & license for future use.

Be it Resolved by the Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas.

Section 1. That the City of Ottawa, Kansas, enter into a license agreement with Activated Sludge, Inc., providing for future use until expiration of latest patent, by the City of Ottawa, Kansas, in sewage disposal plant of said city, to make and use all apparatus and processes covered by all patents issued by the United States Patent Office owned by Activated Sludge, Inc.

Section 2. That the Mayor of the City of Ottawa, Kansas be and he is hereby authorized to execute such agreement and the City Clerk of said city to attest the same on behalf of said City of Ottawa, Kansas.

Section 3. That this resolution shall become effective from and after its due adoption and approval by the Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas.

The foregoing resolution was duly adopted this day by a unanimous vote of the City Governing Body.

August 30, 1934, by stipulation between R.R. Redmond, City Attorney of the City of Ottawa, Kansas and attorneys for Activated Sludge Inc. the date to answer or otherwise plead was extended to October 14, 1934.

September 10, 1934 the city received from Activated Sludge an Agreement for past infringement and License for future use, which if executed by the City of Ottawa, Kansas would be considered final and full satisfaction for the alleged infringements. This basis of settlement figured to cost the City of Ottawa the sum of \$ 3999.20 and rather than pay such a sum for damages not yet established the Governing Body thought best to proceed to contest the suit in court.

October 4, 1934 a meeting of the attorneys for the seven cities involved was held at Wichita, Kansas and at this meeting the several cities received another offer of settlement from Activated Sludge Inc. which, in the case of the City of Ottawa amounted to the sum of \$ 2200.00. As soon as this last offer was received four of the cities represented gave every indication of raising their tail and closing the case by accepting this last offer. When the Ottawa City Attorney reported this to the Governing Body it really placed an entirely different light on the case for the reason that if only one or two cities were obliged to contest the case the expense of so doing would be excessive. It was decided, however, that in so far as we had until October 14, 1934 to answer or otherwise plead it would be well to defer action a few days longer.

October 8, 1934 the Supreme Court of the United States refused to hear the appeal of the City of Milwaukee on a case identical with that of the City of Ottawa which was an appeal from an adverse decision of the United Circuit Court of Appeals for the seventh District.

October 13, 1934 City Attorney filed Motion in the United States District Court at Topeka, Kansas for an extension of time within which to plead or otherwise answer.

October 18, 1934 the United States District Court, Northern District of Illinois, Eastern Division handed down an adverse decision against the Sanitary District of Chicago in an action similar to ours.

October 19, 1934 Conference at Topeka, Kansas with attorneys for Activated Sludge Inc. and the City of Ottawa Officials at which conference the City Governing Body offered to settle for the sum of \$ 1500.00. This offer seemed wise in so far as all other cities involved had executed agreements with Activated Sludge in accord with the offer above referred to.

October 26, 1934 the offer of \$ 1500.00 made by the City of Ottawa on the 19th instant was rejected by Activated Sludge, Inc. and a final offer of \$ 2100.00 in full settlement for past infringements and license for future use was tendered by them.

The resolution appearing elsewhere in the minutes of this meeting being evidence that the case was finally closed on the basis of the final offer above stated.

All papers, letters, agreements, pleadings etc. having to do with the proceedings had in this case are on file in the office of the City Clerk under the filing title of Sewage Disposal Works.



Encroachment Resolution: Re: Federal Imp. S. Main

Whereas, the State Highway Commission of Kansas and the United States Bureau of Public Roads are desirous of constructing US Highway Nos. 73W from 13th street to 7th street on US 73W and 50S from 7th street to Park street on US 50S on Main street in the City of Ottawa, and known as Project No. US 73W-18-NRM 273F (1935) and US 50S-40B-NRM 273F (1935), State of Kansas; and

Whereas, said State Highway Commission of Kansas, and the United States Bureau of Public Roads of the Department of Agriculture of the United States, have made certain requirements that, if the above parties agree to construct said highway and if said highway is so constructed by them within said city of Ottawa, said city shall agree to meet said requirements hereinafter mentioned specifically.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the Mayor and Governing Body of the City of Ottawa, Kansas, that in consideration of the agreements of the State Highway Commission of Kansas and the United States Bureau of Public Roads to construct said US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S or a portion of said highway, within the city of Ottawa, Kansas, said city agrees to the following:

1. That it will remove all existing advertising signs and all encroachments from the limits of the right of way shown on the plans as required for the construction of the project and will not in the future permit the erection of any advertising signs or encroachments of any kind upon the right of way of the streets of said city over which the traffic of US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S is routed.

2. That it will provide that all excavated tranches, within the limits of the right of way (such as excavation for sewers, water mains and connections etc.) that are made in advance of construction of the Project, shall be backfilled in accordance with State Highway Commission of Kansas specifications in advance of the construction of the Project.

3. That it will fix the speed limit of the city street (or streets) used by US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S in said city at not less than thirty miles per hour.

(over)

4. That it will not permit the existence of any signs, semaphores or signals of any character that will give preference to local routes, or to the traffic of cross, or abutting streets, or that will delay, or hinder, traffic on those streets of said city over which the traffic of US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S is routed; provided, however, that if "STOP AND GO" lights are in use at the present time and are deemed necessary on a portion of the route traveled by US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S, the same may be permitted with the understanding that the intercal of time allowed shall not unduly slow up the traffic using the street marked as US Highway Nos. 73W and 50S, and that no additional "STOP AND GO" lights will be installed on said highway within said city without a concurrence by the city officials and the Kansas Highway Commission as to the necessity of said lights.

5. That it will obtain and provide in advance of construction all the right of way in said city, as shown on the approved plans to be necessary to construct the project.

7. That it will save the State Highway Commission of Kansas and the United States Bureau of Public Roads forever harmless from any and all damages which may accrue to any persons or corporations by reason of said right of way being obtained; and further agrees that it will not pass any laws, rules, regulations or ordinances which would be in conflict with the above agreement.

Maintenance Resolution: In Re, Fed. Imp. S. Main

WHEREAS, the State Highway Commission will obtain the approval of the Secretary of Agriculture of a project for the improvement of 0.8 miles of Brick Pavement, known as Main Street and designed as U.S. Public Works Highway Project No. US 73W-18 NRM 273 F (1935) and US 50S-40B-NRM 273F (1935) to be improved with funds obtained under Section 204 of the National Industrial Recovery Act.




Orders: In Re: Federal Improvement of S. Main st.


